
HERE'S WHAT WE DO

- Civic responsibility.







OUR PROUD HISTORY

New Facility Will Be Across the Street from Original Site

Created by a local board of directors in 1953 and chartered in 1961 by the national organization, Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Kalamazoo has been a powerful force to improve the lives of thousands of children in our community. Two towering figures, Dick Milne and Bob Ezelle, led the Clubs for more than five decades, but success has resulted from the collective work of countless individuals, community organizations and foundations, along with boards of directors, staff members and volunteers.

In his 20 years of service, Milne distinguished himself by moving the Clubs to the Edison School, creating what became a national movement to serve both boys and girls, and mentoring Ezelle, a leadership figure whose influence touched every part of the community.

Founded at the corner of Portage and Vine, right across the street from where the new facility will be built, the Boys Club as it was then known, was one of the first, if not the first, club in the nation to begin serving both boys and girls.


After-school activities, the signature work of the Clubs, blossomed over the years into educational, character-building and life-enhancing programs to meet the complex needs of young people and their families.
